Course Description:

Analysis of selected, significant motion pictures of the world's cinema, from the silent period to the present.

Course Description (extended):

This section of Film Appreciation is a web-lecture hybrid class. Each week students will be expected to watch a feature length film *outside of class* **and** post to our Canvas discussion board (canvas.uncg.edu). Then on Monday nights we will meet for a lecture and discussion about the films we've watched.

This class will cover a roughly 130 year span of cinema history, starting with some of the first films ever made and ending with some modern masterpieces. We will study the formal elements of filmmaking (cinematography, editing, art direction, etc.) and the techniques involved therein. We will also analyze the thematic content, genre and artistic and social significance of the films we watch.

Students will *not* be required to purchase a textbook, but *will be* required to purchase or stream approx 12 feature films outside of class. All required films are available via iTunes, and some may be available via other streaming services. Supplemental readings will be provided online.

<u>There will also be two short online tests and a slightly longer online final exam that, together, constitute the majority of your grade.</u>

Recommended Textbook:

Looking at Movies: An Introduction to Film. Edition 4. Barsam, Richard. Norton, W.W. & Company, Inc. 2012. (Again, this textbook is *not* required)
