Catalog Description:

Development of practical editing skills in pacing, shot selection, and the workflow necessary for delivery.

Objectives:

- 1) Demonstrate competency with post-production software and equipment.
- 2) Achieve basic understanding of post-production workflow.
- 3) To introduce various elements such as color grading, compositing, sound design, and sound mixing.
- 4) Further develop your stylistic voice as a filmmaker/artist.
- 5) Build critical creative experience working in post-production

Technical Requirements:

- Portable Hard Drive(s). A minimum of 1 portable hard drive is required. (Two portable drives are recommended, one for editing & one for protected storage of original media files). The editing drive is required & must have USB 3 connectivity. USB 2.0 data throughput is too slow for HD video editing, please note: not all of our workstations support USB 3.0. Storage drives can have USB connectivity. Portable hard drives must be formatted MAC OS Extended (journaled). If your hard drive is formatted FAT32, you could experience a number of frustrating problems.
- **Headphones** (over the ear, **NOT** earbuds if possible—it makes a big difference) You are expected to use headphones when working in the Carmichael Computer Lab.
- Please note that the Carmichael Lab is currently available for your use. I will supply the names of my enrolled students to the university to get you 24/7 access to that space. Please be mindful and safe, and practice social distancing (etc.) within that building.

Currently the labs and campus are open, you are free to use the Media Studies Department lab at any time there is not a class being conducted in there. This Editing 1 class primarily uses Adobe software with a focus on Premiere Pro.

TRIGGER WARNING!!

This course covers a very wide variety of content. Some technology and projects we encounter could include strobing visuals, which have been known in about 3% of people with epilepsy, exposure to **flashing lights** at certain intensities or to certain visual patterns can **trigger** seizures. There may also be occasional content which could involve **mature content**.

Course Activities:

Workshops/Exercises:

Throughout the course, you will complete a series of learning exercises intended to develop your basic technological and creative skill set. These exercises are crucial to developing technical competencies in order to complete your major assignments. I expect students to do every exercise assigned.

All workshops are due within two weeks after they go live (so, at 11:59pm on the 2nd Wednesday after this is released)

These workshops or exercises may include:

- Compositing: student shows understanding of compositing within a still image and within a video.
- o Lumetri exercise: student demonstrates an understanding of the Lumetri controls for color correction.
- Key Frame exercise: Student demonstrates an understanding of using keyframes to control aspects of an image.
- Speed Ramping exercise: Student demonstrates an understanding of speed ramping to control aspects of timing.
- o **Text in Video exercise:** Student demonstrates an understanding of using text in a video.
- Transcribing: student shows basic competency in strategies in transcribing an interview and generate a paper edit.
- o **Sound exercise:** Round Tripping into Adobe Audition to clean up sound.

Readings and Discussions:

I will occasionally assign readings and expect everyone to fully read and comprehend the content of the readings, and be

able to participate in class discussions. These could be in person or within Canvas. If in Canvas, your post should be about a couple of paragraphs or between 100-200 words. After you post your response, respond thoughtfully to the posts of at least 2 classmates.

Projects & Assignments:

You will be given technical assignments regarding software related workshops and creative techniques you have been shown in class. I expect students to complete every assigned project/assignment. These assignments may include:

- o **Montage:** Using the provided footage and sound files create a montage using one of the Russian Montage approaches (Metric, Rhythmic, Tonal, Overtonal/Associational or Intellectual).
- o **Continuity Editing:** Using the provided footage and sound files, each student will create a 2 minute (minimum) edit in traditional continuity editing style.
- Music Video Editing: Using the provided footage and sound files, each student will create a music video.
- Documentary Editing: Using the provided footage and sound files, each student will create a paper edit suitable for the assets provided.
- Sound Redesign Project: In this assignment you will create a new sound design for an already existing scene. Acquire a scene from a film (approximately 1 3 min in length). The scene is completely your choice. If you'd like to collaborate and split or share the responsibilities, the scene should be 1-2 minutes longer. Post the original scene you have selected to redesign on your blog. Turn in a document that charts out all of the sound in your scene as you found it, broken down on a timeline to voice, music, sound effects, background. Be as specific as possible so, if the voice is heard from another room and there is a change in eq or a reverb, note that. If sounds overlap, note that as well and describe which is louder. Think creatively about ways that you might graph it out. I'd suggest listening on speakers the first time and then on headphones. There may sounds that you don't hear the first couple times through. (by the beginning of class, email me a digital version or hand in a physical copy) Next, focus on stripping away (completely) the sound and building a new sound design with sound effects and some music, and possibly dialog or voice-over. The assignment aims to show how much potential you have in changing the meaning of a scene by changing the sound. During your labs, you will present a work-in-progress—which is as close to a final edit that you can create. You have the weekend to update and finalize your scene, and then submit the final version for a full class review.
- Final Project: Each student is to create an essay film per the provided instructions.

Concerns:

Media making is a very time-consuming process, even postproduction. A strong edit takes time and dedication. No edit is EVER finished in the 1st round. Project planning and scheduling will be large factors in this course that will determine the overall success of your work. Procrastination simply isn't an option. Additionally, please remember that it is generally believed that to master any given subject, a bare minimum of 10,000 hours is required.
